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#### Aims

The overall goal of this class is to provide a fundamental understanding in the theories of planet formation and dynamics, such that you can read the literature and follow colloquia on these topics. It will also give you the opportunity to do your own research and practice giving presentations.

### Outline

- 1. Observational overview of the solar system and detection methods of exoplanetary systems
- 2. Structure and evolution of protoplanetary disks
- 3. Planet formation from dust to terrestrial and giant planets
- 4. Planet dynamics: migration, resonances, secular torques, stability

#### **Textbooks**

Though no textbook is required in this course, I recommend:

- 1. Astrophysics of Planet Formation (Philip J. Armitage, Cambridge University Press)

  A great set of review articles covering planet formation and dynamics, planet detection and planetary structure.
- 3. Solar System Dynamics (Carl Murray and Stan Dermott) For the more dynamically inclined student, this is a classic.
